PRESS STATEMENT

VACCINATION CAMPAIGN:

As you will recall, we have been accelerating our COVID-19 vaccination campaign. On 28th of January, 2022 we scaled up our advocacy and communication campaign and diversified our out-

reach services to reach as many people as possible. On Thursday 3rd February we partnered with the Ministry of Interior and National Coordination to enlist the support of chiefs and their assistants, to mobilize communities to turn up and receive the vaccines, which are now adequately available across the country.

I am happy to report that during the past two weeks, the country has administered over **3 million doses (3,129,294)**. The program has therefore witnessed a daily average vaccination rate of nearly **224,000** up from an average of **80,000** witnessed late last year. As of today, **14.2 million** persons above 18 years (more than half of the adult population) have received at least one dose and **6.9 million (25%)** are now fully vaccinated.

The support we have received from the chiefs has increased access to the elderly. Now **44.5%** of persons above 58 years of age are fully vaccinated and we project this to rise to 50% by the end of next week, meaning that we shall soon have vaccinated and

protected half of the population, which is mostly at risk of severe disease and death from COVID-19 infection.

The stock status of COVID-19 vaccines is stable. We have adequate doses to continue with our mass vaccination campaign and an assured pipeline to administer at least 30 million doses by end of June.

Contrary to some media reports that 10 million doses of vaccines are lying in the stores, we wish to clarify as follows. **7 million** of these doses have already been distributed to the counties and are currently being used in the ongoing mass vaccination campaign including out-reaches. Only **2.9 million** doses are still available in our Central vaccines stores in Kitengela. Majority of these doses (2.3 million doses) are Johnson and Johnson which have a long self-life and therefore not at risk of expiry. All doses of AstraZeneca with short expiry have been distributed for use on the ongoing campaign.

We have scheduled the delivery of **4 million** more doses before the end of this month. There should be no reason why any Kenyan should not receive their vaccination and be protected from this ongoing pandemic.

As of February 11th 2022, a total of **15,030,753** vaccines have been administered across the country. Of these, **7,333,064** are partially vaccinated while those fully vaccinated are **6,866,516**. Another **610,792** are doses administered to those between 15 to 17 years while **220,381** are booster doses.

The total number of vaccines administered in the last 24 hours is **240,152** while the total number of people fully vaccinated in the last 24 hours is **96,950**. The uptake of the second dose among those who received their first dose was at **63.3%**. Proportion of

adults fully vaccinated was **25.2%**. The Government is working towards vaccinating a targeted population of **27,246,033**.

Today **48** people have tested positive for the disease, from a sample size of **6,684** tested in the last 24 hours. The positivity rate is now at **0.7%**. From the cases, **41** are Kenyans while **7** are foreigners. **28** males and **20** are females. The youngest is a **five-year-old child** while the oldest is **81** years. Total confirmed

positive cases are now **322,436** and cumulative tests so far conducted are **3,290,980**.

In terms of **County** distribution; Nairobi **21**, Mombasa **5**, Kajiado **3**, Kilifi **3**, Kiambu **2**, Kisii **2**, Kisumu **2**, Meru **2**, Nakuru **2**, Turkana **2**, Migori **1**, Nandi **1**, Kericho **1** and Nyeri **1**.

Distribution of positive cases by age is as follows; 0-9 years **(4)**, 10-19 years **(1)**, 20-29 years **(5)**, 30-39 **(10)**, 40-49 **(18)**, 50-59 **(4)**, 60 years and above **(6)**.

Today **46** patients have recovered from the disease, **30** are from the Home-Based Isolation and Care program while **16** are from various health facilities countrywide. Total recoveries now stand at **302,693** of whom **249,929** are from the Home-Based Care and Isolation program, while **52,764** are from various health facilities countrywide.

Sadly, **3** patients have succumbed to the disease, **one** of them in the last 24 hours while the other **two** are late deaths reported after conducting facility record audits in the month of February 2022. Therefore, the cumulative fatalities to **5,629**. Our sincere condolences to the family and friends that lost their loved ones.

Cumulative deaths by age; 0-9 years (**62**), 10-19 years (**42**), 20-29 (**149**), 30-39 years (**407**), 40-49 years (**643**), 50-59 years (**1,026**), 60 years and above (**3,296**).

A total of **172** patients are currently admitted in various health facilities countrywide, while **1,059** are under the Home-Based Isolation and Care program. **4** patients are in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU), **3** of them on ventilatory support and **1** on supplemental oxygen. Another **55** patients are on supplemental oxygen, **52** of

them are in the general wards while **three** patients are in the High Dependency Unit (HDU).
